




The Aspirations of Ordinary People

for a day of family-friendly learning and fun.**





- Learn about historical sites in “old” Andover that stood in 1775 and helped to shape our nation’s journey to independence.
- Our experienced guides will share captivating stories and insights of our local connections to the revolution. As the bus passes more than 20 homes, you will hear the engaging stories and anecdotes about the people who lived in them in the 1775 era. The bus will stop twice for passengers to get off, one in each town:
 - At the Timothy Johnson House, take a short tour of the historic kitchen and dining room and enjoy a glass of lemonade.
 - At the Blanchard Upton House, take a short garden tour and enjoy a glass of cider.
- Connect with your neighbors and foster a sense of pride in our intertwined past and the aspirations of ordinary people in our towns in 1775.

BONUS !

Take a tour of the steeple of the North Parish Church and view the original Paul Revere bell.

- Tours will be scheduled to take place before and after the shuttle tour at designated times. Meet at the entrance to the North Parish Church
- Each tour is limited to 10 people who can navigate the steep ladders to the steeple and bell.
- A TV video tour of the steeple will be available to watch at North Parish for those who are unable to climb the ladders.
- These tours will be available on the hour and the half-hour at North Parish Church from 10am to 4pm.

Tour maps will be available for purchase at NAHS after April 19th for your own self-driving tour!

At the Upton Blanchard House in Andover, enjoy a short garden tour and a glass of cider.	Each steeple tour is limited to 10 people who are able to navigate the steep steps. Check out the exhibit and enjoy lunch at Diane's Café on the Common after your tour.
